Hint and Answer



Hint: This building is located next to a wood-framed house that was built around 1904 and was used as head quarters for canal building operations. Later it became the lockmaster's house. Now it is open to the public as a visitor's centre.
Answer: Kingston Mills Lockstation/Anglin Centre/ Locks 46-49



Hint: Here, the main CN rail line crosses over the lower locks (there are 3 locks) on a bridge originally built for the Grand Trunk Railroad in 1853, replaced c.1890 and replaced again with the current steel bridge in 1929.
Answer: Train Bridge/Kingston Mills Lockstation



Hint: This busy lock has much to offer. A mill, a museum and a resort are found nearby.

Answer: Chaffey's Lock/Lock 37



Hint: This site is located 1 km upstream from the lockstation. When you visit here, the two-hour walking tour is a must.

Answer: Burritt's Rapids Swing Bridge/Lock 17



Hint: This landmark attraction was declared a National Historic Site of Canada in 1983. It was built in 1912, by the Dominion Railway Company. Though it has not been in use since 1978, it still attracts many visitors and is located near the town's Railway Museum, another must-see Rideau area site. **Answer: Bascule Bridge/Smills Falls**

Hint: N 44° 56.770' W 75° 49.350'
Answer: Clowes Lockstation/Lock 20

7.



Hint: From this lock, late-season visitors can enjoy a short walk to a nearby apple orchard.
Answer: Lower Brewers/Lock 45

Hint: Don't get turned around. One could spend all day exploring this lockstation.
Answer: Jones Falls Turning Basin/ Locks 42-39

9.



Hint: One of four remaining King Post Truss wooden swing bridges that cross the Rideau, this lockstation is also home to an Osprey whose nest sits atop a hydro pole.
Answer: Swing Bridge at Nicholson's Lock

10.



Hint: "The Ark" a nearby private residence sits on the shore of the basin near this lockstation.
Answer: Upper Brewers/Locks 44-43

11.



Hint: This lockstation features a beautiful pastoral setting and a large stone arch dam (as does Jones Falls but this picture is of Long Island)
Answer: Long Island Lockstation/Locks 16-14 (as does Jones Falls but this picture is of Long Island)

12.



Hint: One of the oldest burying grounds on the Rideau can be found just up the road from this lockstation.
Answer: Nicholson's Lockstation/ Locks 19-18

13.



Hint: This "original" lock is located in the heart of a Rideau town close to another must-see museum.

Answer: Old combined Smiths Falls Lock/Lock 29

14.



Hint: Also known as a "solitude lock", this is one of the most remote locks on the Rideau.
Answer: Davis Lock/Lock 32

15.



Hint: Three locks here mark the end (or beginning, depending on your heading) of the longest lock-free stretch of Rideau River.

Answer: Long Island / Lock 14

16.



Hint: You must know this one. Enjoy the flight when you visit this capital attraction located next door to a very famous hill.

Answer: Ottawa Flight Locks/Locks 1-7/Bytown Museum/Ottawa

17.



Hint: This double lock was named after an early settler in the area and can be found close to town and steps from a museum.

Answer: Old Slys Locks/ Locks 27-26



18.

Hint: One of the most popular lockstations on the Rideau, this one also is home to a very big dam.

Answer: Lock gates and lock wall at Jones Falls/ Locks 42-49



19.

Hint: An interesting view off the beaten path at one of the prettiest lockstations on the entire Rideau waterway.

Answer: Jones Falls Lockstation/Locks 42-49



20.

Hint: If you can, name the equipment pictured here and the location.

Answer: Long Island Lockstation/Winch/Lockworks
